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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Vidya Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Nagpur established in the year 1986, is one of the oldest trusts in Vidarbha. VSPM currently runs 03 UG colleges, 18 schools in different villages, a Medical College, an MBA college, etc. Shri Ranjitbabu Deshmukh is the president of VSPM Academy and Shri. Bhausaheb Bhoge is founder.

In 1986 in the name of the late Shri Arvindbabu Deshmukh a renowned social worker and father of Shri Ranjitbabu Deshmukh, VSPM opened the college Arvindbabu Deshmukh Mahavidyalaya in 1986 in small village Bharsingi. The college which started with the strength of 75 students in a rural area now provides education to nearly 2000 students at present.

The institution's campus is spread over lush green land over an area of 6.645 acres. It has been providing quality higher education in Arts, Commerce and Science. The institution runs a total of 03 UG, 02 PG, and Certificate courses. The institution is permanently affiliated with RTM, Nagpur University, Nagpur, and is approved under sections 2(f) and 12(b) of the University Grants Commission (UGC) act.

In 2017 college was reaccredited with B++ grade by NAAC with a CGPA of 2.81. The college has a VISION and MISSION and it works accordingly for the students in rural areas. Colleges doing more progress in different areas such as infrastructure, academics, sports, social, etc. in different areas. The has been awarded with ISO Certification. The college also conducted a Green and Energy Audit.

The college always tries to improve the education quality. To stimulate the academic atmosphere to enhance the quality of teaching-learning and research by using modern modes of education. The college runs different activities for students under the NSS, Sports, cultural, Competitive examination, and career counselling so that students get the opportunity to develop themselves and be aware of the different career opportunities.

In the last few years, students have appeared in the university merit lists, students have won awards in sports at the National and state levels, students performed well in different activities all over the universities, are taking higher educations, and got placement. We always work as a team to give an equal opportunity to these students from rural areas to compete with the students from urban regions and make career opportunities.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The institution is permanently affiliated with RTM Nagpur University, Nagpur, and scrupulously follows the curricula prescribed by the university.

2. The Institution offers 14 UG and 2 PG programs at present.

3. The college runs Certificate courses for the students which are self-financed.

4. The institute prepares an academic calendar and adheres to it. The college conducted all academic activities and did continuous internal evaluations through it.

5. Faculty show good representation in university boards of studies and academic councils for Course design committees, Moderation, Paper setting, and Paper valuation.

6. The college conducted various activities that included guest lectures, workshops, and awareness programs regarding gender, human values, and environmental sustainability.

7. The college regularly collects feedback from the stakeholders, discusses it in meetings, analyzes it, and actions are taken as per the requirement.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- 1. Enrolment of students is done as per the reserved seats available category-wise, as per the regulation and act of the Maharashtra government.
- 2. The college appointed nearly 80 percent of highly qualified staff as per the sanctioned post which improve the teaching, learning, and evaluation process.
- 3. More than 60 percent of staff are Ph.D. while others are pursuing a Ph.D.
- 4. For the students development efforts are taken to make the learning process more effective like guest lectures, workshops, seminars, tour visits, and quizzes are conducted to improve the learning process.
- 5. Continuous internal evaluation process involved in the academic calendar in which the college conducted unit tests, terminal exams, assignments, seminars, etc.
- 6. Slow learners are identified from the class test, and unit test, and extra classes are conducted for them. Advanced learners are identified from marks and interaction skills, such students are encouraged to participate in various activities and competitions organized at college, university, state, and national levels.
- 7. Various student-centric learning methods and tools such as field projects, ICT-facilitated classrooms, etc. are used to make teaching-learning processes effective.
- 8. The institution has made the practice of displaying learning outcomes and communicating to teachers as well as students and uploading the same on the website of our college. The outcome of learning is assessed from time to time.

9. The pass percentage of final-year students are quite impressive which is one the way to measure the learning outcomes.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- 1. The college did not have any research project during the last five years as many faculty appointed recently but two departments Physics and Botany, published the 01 patent each.
- 2. College conducted Conferences for various streams of social science, science, physical education, etc. Workshops on IPR, workshops, and seminars at departmental with research and industrial approach.
- 3. Faculty published research papers in UGC-notified journals, many research papers in peer-reviewed journals, and research papers in conference proceedings. Faculty members also published the books and paper in chapter-edited books.
- 4. The college conducted many activities through NSS in the neighborhood community to sensitize students to social issues in nearby villages Inderwada and Rohana.
- 5. The college conducted many extension activities under the scheme Swachha Bharat Abhiyaan, gender issues, environmental sustainability, etc. in collaboration with the community, university, and NGOs.
- 6. The college was awarded with the best NSS college and best program officer by the university during the session 2021-22
- 7. The college made MoUs and Linkages for academic activities like job training, field trips, and student and faculty exchange.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- 1. Our institution has excellent infrastructure and learning resources such as well-furnished classrooms, a classroom with an ICT facility, an audio-visual room, well-equipped laboratories, a Computer lab, and other support facilities.
- 2. The college has infrastructure for sports activities like an indoor stadium. spacious playground, Basketball Court, Gymnasium, green gym, etc.
- 3. The Library is fully automated with integrated Library Management System Liebman Software, the library has a functional issue return system through the software.
- 4. learning resources like INFLIBNET, N-list, e-journals, e-books, etc. are available in our library. The college also has membership in E-shod Ganga and E-shod Sindhu.
- 5. The college has a computer lab and computer facility in the library for the students with a high internet facility of 50 Mbps. The college updated the IT facility as per the requirements.
- 6. The budget for infrastructure, Library, and other learning resources is earmarked annually depending upon the recommendation of concerned committees constituted for upgrading, maintaining, and utilizing physical, academic, and support facilities.

Student Support and Progression

1. The institution has a well-established student support system for financial/scholarship assistance, capability enhancement/development, student progression

2. Students benefit from the different schemes like scholarships for the category students, free shipping, and the Chhatrapati Shahu Maharaj scholarship from the government. An institutional scholarship scheme has been

started for the students based on merit from session 2021-22.

3. The college provides an environment for capacity building and skill enhancement of students for that college organized several guest lectures, workshops, and training programs for the students.

4. The college more focus on competitive examination and career counselling for the students for that we organized lecture series, workshops, and guest lectures to aware students and prepare them in a competent environment.

5. Reading room facility, INFLIBNET, e-journals, Newspapers, Magazines, Competitive exam guidance, etc. are available for students who show interest in acquiring higher education and appearing for competitive exams.

6. The Placement cell maintains a strong relationship with cooperative sectors and supports students in placements. Placement cell and Skill development programs strengthen student's capabilities and encourage them for jobs. Many students progress to higher education in various streams. In the last five years, many students have been placed in CRPF, the Indian Army, and different offices in Private and Government Sectors.

7. Students are encouraged to participate in sports and cultural events, students receive awards/medals at National, State, and University level tournaments and in various cultural events. 02 students from the college won awards in Khelo India and 01 student was selected for the world university championship in China.

8. The college has a grievance redressal cell for the students and staff whose work is to aware the stakeholders regarding the guidelines of the committee, to organise an awareness program, and to work on any complaint registered.

9. The institution has a registered alumnus, who got the registration in the current year 2023. Under the alumni association, more than 200 students are registered. Alumni support the college in financial and non-financial ways. During the last five years, many alumni have delivered guest lectures, and workshops for the students on different occasions.

Governance, Leadership and Management

6. The college has effective welfare measures, the college provides CL, DL, ML, Maternity leaves, and EL as per the university regulation to teaching and non-teaching staff. Along with this group insurance, loan facilities are made available to them under different schemes.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary: 1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	The college currently runs the UG courses B.A., B.Sc. B. Com and one PG Non-grant course M.A. Marathi, M.Com. Along with this college conducted value-added courses that are open to all-discipline students. Students of all disciplines are encouraged to participate in activities like workshops, seminars, field visits, sports, NSS, and cultural activities conducted in college. It helps students to receive knowledge of different disciplines. University-level discussion on curricular reforms as per NEP 2020 Initiating the curricular revision with choices, in the backdrop of student feedback. The college proposing the plan to add new courses in college from the upcoming academic session which provide more opportunities to the students of nearby rural areas. The college also runs different certificate courses for students of 30 Hrs which help them with skill development and it also gives them a routine for doing project work/Internships from such courses.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The academic bank credits system is very beneficial for students. In our college, the UG course is three years and PG is two years as per the curriculum of the university. Students are made aware of the ABC system and the college also appointed a coordinator for providing information to the students. Many students are registered on ABC and add their information and credits are allotted to them. During the current year's admission process, it was made compulsory for the students to register themselves for ABC.
3. Skill development:	Recognizing and enhancing skills for better opportunities of employment. The college runs different certificate courses for students of 30 Hrs. which help them with skill development and it also gives them a routine for doing project work/Internships from such courses. Establishing several clubs or societies for the skill development of students. Syllabi revision to integrate multidisciplinary skill component. Identification of professional skills useful for professional life. Improvement in the employability of students locally. Improvement in employability in cutting-edge areas. Courses on value-based education. Integration of values and skills in the curriculum. A Curriculum enrooted in constitutional values, ethics, and respect for Indian culture art, and heritage.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The undergraduate course includes subjects like History, Political science, Economics, Marathi, English, and music. The curriculum of all these subjects comprises courses that impart the history and knowledge traditions of India. In addition to the curricular prospects, these departments conduct several co-curricular programs that foster the dissemination of Indian history, culture, and knowledge traditions among the young students at the college through NSS, cultural, sports, and club events.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The college currently runs the UG courses B.A., B.Sc. B. Com and one PG course M.A. Marathi. The college already focuses on, program outcomes (POS), Program-specific outcomes (PSO), and course outcomes (COS) of these courses which are mentioned. Along with these college runs skill-based courses, workshops, and activities through different committees such as NSS, Cultural, Sports, Clubs, Departments, competitive examinations, and career counseling which also provide opportunities for the students to achieve their goals.
6. Distance education/online education:	Training the students to self-explore by visiting the online freely available education materials like spoken tutorials from IITs and SWAYAM. Students are encouraged to participate in online workshops conducted by renowned institutes. Encouraging students to acquire extra credit with regular credits can help them learn new things and be ready for the needs of new markets. Improving the quality of the ICT center already available in the college by giving adequate technical support to speed up the learning process.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

This college is affiliated with Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University in the state of Maharashtra. All programs offered at the college follow the R.T.M Nagpur University syllabi and guidelines. The curriculum is taught through theoretical and practical lectures, and the college has an efficient timetable committee that ensures effective delivery of the curriculum. Here is how we structure and implement the curriculum:

- 1. Academic Calendar: The IQAC prepares the academic calendar at the beginning of the session based on the RTM Nagpur University academic calendar.
- 2. Admission of the students is strictly done as per the guidelines of reservation policy and seat quota laid by the State Government and university. The centralized admission procedure is followed on a merit basis.
- 3. Timetable: The college prepares the timetable based on the number of students, required time period, and workload distribution, and departmental timetables are created for proper organization.
- 4. Syllabus: The college follows the syllabus provided by the university's board of studies under the Maharashtra and UGC acts. The committee members receive suggestions from expert professors in each subject and make necessary decisions. The faculty members create a teaching plan for each subject every semester, considering the number of working days and adjusting the minimum working days needed for effective execution.
- 5. Teaching Methods: In addition to traditional teaching methods, the college uses ICT tools and smart classrooms. Departments also organize guest lectures, workshops, seminars, and quiz competitions to improve student results.
- 6. Continuous Evaluation: The curriculum's evaluation plan includes unit tests, mid-semester and end-semester exams, seminars, viva, industrial tours, visits, assignments, and more. The evaluation method helps in marking theory internal and overall development of the student based on values. At the department level guest lectures, workshops, extension activities, awareness activities under eco-club, student seminars, field visits, study tours, orientation programs, etc. students' active participation is also observed through these activities. Final exams are conducted by the university each semester, and results are declared stream-wise within 45 days.
- 7. Internal and Practical Submission: Faculty submit internal, external, and practical marks through the university's online portal based on the evaluation process of the college and student performance in respective exams.
- 8. Extra-Curricular Activities: NSS, sports, cultural activities, social activities, and other events are organized to promote overall student development.
- 9. University Exam: Students' final exams are conducted by the affiliated universities as per the

schedule provided. The college compares the results with its internal evaluation.

- 10. Feedback: The college collects feedback from stakeholders and looks for ways to improve.
- 11. Expenditure: The college allocates budget and expenditure for infrastructure and maintenance of physical and academic facilities.

The curriculum of the institute integrates important values such as professional ethics, gender equity, human values, environment, and sustainability. The institute conducts various activities and programs to instill these values and ethics, such as celebrating the birth and death anniversaries of important people, observing National and International days, conducting NSS Awareness programs, Blood Donation Camps, Awareness Rallies, and cleanliness programs regularly.

NSS conducts awareness programs on COVID-19, distributes masks, and organizes rallies for hygiene, and no plastic campaigns. The institute believes in equality for both male and female students and promotes their participation in curricular and extra-curricular activities. The institute also aims to increase awareness of safety, hygiene, and health for female students and women in society. To achieve this, the college has a Women's cell committee and an Internal complaint committee that organizes various activities. The institute conducts workshops on topics such as the role of nutrition in women's health and Covid-19 awareness on Mother's Day. Additionally, the college is under CCTV surveillance to ensure the safety of both male and female students. For girls' students college has a girls' common room with an equipped facility and a Sanitary napkin machine is installed in the common room for girls.

The institute places great importance on the environment and sustainability and conducts various activities to raise awareness among students. The eco club at the college organizes guest lectures, workshops, and quizzes on the topic. Participation in competition: - Our many students have participated in different activities organized by other institutes and our institute at the National, State, and University levels such as Video-making, seminars, quizzes, and essay competitions and they also get awarded prizes.

Guest lecture/Webinar/Awareness program: - For students' guest lectures, webinars, awareness programs, and departmental activities were organized in which students show their participation and it make their learning experience more efficient.

Competitive Examination and Career Counselling: - In today's developing environment, competitive examination is one of the paths for the good future of the students. Problem-solving methodologies

Social activity, awareness programs, and social work, through NSS teach them about society, their problems, and the opportunity to think and try to solve the problems in society.

Use of ICT Tools

During teaching use of ICT, the facility makes the teaching more effective. Nowadays it is very handy tools are available to teach students using such ICT facilities, students are also showing interest in the learning process and the teaching and learning process become more effective. Our faculties members are making regular use of these ICT tools during teaching and organizing other activities. During the Covid-19 pandemic, students were unable to come to the college but it was important to complete their academic session. For that, our faculty members used an online platform for teaching during the complete session. Using this online platform all the students' student-related activities such as lectures,

unit tests, terminal exams, guest lectures, seminars, workshops, and awareness activities are conducted for the students using tools such as Zoom platform, WhatsApp, YouTube, Google form, Google classroom, etc.

- 1. There are four ICT-enabled classrooms that are equipped with LCD projectors, a sound system, visualization, and a LAN connection that allows computer images to be displayed.
- 2. There is one audiovisual room for conducting programs and activities which is equipped with LCD projectors, a sound system, a visualizer, a LAN connection, and a Smart podium.
- 3. The institution has installed a Wi-Fi unit for the students inside the campus with a speed of 50 MBPS.
- 4. Faculty developed E-content that is available to students on the college website like YouTube videos, study material, quizzes, PPT etc.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

As the institution is an affiliated college, it maintains and follows the pattern of internal assessment as prescribed by the university in the respective subjects. Every department in each semester makes it transparent by depicting to students about outline and pattern of internal assessment, evaluation, and distribution of marks. Internal assessment carries 20 percent weightage in overall evaluation and 80 percent weightage is by the university examination which includes theory and practical examinations. Students who are admitted for concerned courses are assessed continuously throughout the semester. Well in advance students are informed about the schedule of internal assessment. Apart from evaluating and assessing students, the following major techniques were used for overall personality development.

Internal assessment system already mentioned in the academic calendar unit tests and terminal examinations are conducted as per mentioned in the calendar. For terminal examinations, the paper setting is done as same as the university examination pattern. Attendance of students is monitored by each faculty member and a record of attendance is maintained by each department.

The assignment is given to the students on different topics, students must complete this assignment and submit it to the respective subject teachers. Teachers are making the evaluation of assignments in front of the students and try to solve the all queries of students. The record of assignment submission is maintained by the department.

For some streams, projects are to be submitted which are given to the students by respective departments along with this viva voce to be conducted. Data-related project submission and viva voce maintained by the department.

The practical examination should be conducted for the science stream for that internal and external examiner is provided by the university. Marks are given to the students depending on performance in practical and viva voce.

Environmental studies are made compulsory for the students of S. Y. of all the streams of UG. Grade has to be given to the students depending on the submission of the project and examination conducted.

Internal and External Examination Grievances

College-level Grievances:

Internal marks practical marks and environmental studies grades are given to the students on the basis of their performance in examinations like unit tests, terminal exams, assignments, attendance viva voce, and participation in co-curricular activities. As per the university norms, internal marks practical marks, and environment grades are directly sent to the university without being shown/displayed to the students. So there is no mechanism to deal with examination-related grievances at the college level.

At University level:

Students can face the grievance-related examination as mentioned below and students must follow the procedure mentioned by the university.

Correction in the subject offered: The University provides 3 Days' time to the college to submit such grievances of the students to the university and get redressed observed anomalies.

Correction in Name on Hall: The university gives 7 Days' time to get the hall ticket corrected through the institute.

Correction in Subject Offered on Hall Ticket: The University gives 7 Days' time to get the hall ticket corrected through the college.

Re-valuation & Recounting: If students are not satisfied with the marks awarded, they can apply for recounting as per the university's declared deadline from the declaration of result through the office at the institute.

Being an affiliated and multi-faculty institute, university reforms are followed by the institute. The college continuously evaluates the performance of students through various assessment methods as prescribed by the University for measuring the attainment of program outcomes.

At the start of the session, the syllabus of the course and its question paper pattern are discussed with students by the subject teacher. Thereafter internal assessment and evaluation system was explained to the students to keep Internal assessment transparent. It is conducted by the department before the university examination. The warning is issued to the students having low performance and attendance below 50 percent so that they can make efforts to improve their performance in academics and attendance. Opportunities were given to the students through project work so that they could synthesize knowledge from various areas of learning and apply it critically and creatively. They are assessed according to their overall performance in the particular semester.

The evaluation methods for measuring attainment are as follows which are different according to the program:

Internal Assessment:

It has 20% weightage in the overall evaluation of student performance. Continuous Internal Evaluation of students was done on the basis of performance in—

- 1. Class tests (Unit Test) · It is conducted twice in one semester
- 2. Home Assignments- Assignments are given to the students for different program
- 3. Preliminary Examination-It is conducted at the end of each semester after the completion of the syllabus
- 4. Presentations/seminars
- 5. Viva/oral
- 6. Projects:- It is given to the students of S.Y. in the last same under environmental studies

University/External Assessment:

It has 80% weightage in the overall evaluation of student performance.

At the end of the session University conducts the Examinations, the result of which depicts the attainment of program outcomes and course outcomes.

Practical assessment: To evaluate students' practical performance, practical examinations were conducted within the college by external experts appointed by the University, Practical examination consists of a

written examination and viva.

Above all were the effective methods to measure the level of attainment of program outcomes, programspecific outcomes, and course outcomes. Overall, the method of measuring the level of attainment of program outcomes and course outcomes is based on Performance in University examinations and Internal assessment.

Classrooms: The college has a total of 16 well-furnished classrooms for conducting the classes of the above-mentioned courses. Out of these, there is 04 classroom with ICT facilities which includes a Projector, screen, sound, and Internet facility. All other 12 classrooms have internet facilities.

Laboratory: - There are 04 well-furnished science laboratories equipped with all equipment and materials for the subjects Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, and Physics for performing the practical. There is one Language laboratory available with nearly 60 computers and an internet facility for the use of students for various purposes.

ICT Facility: - There are 04 classrooms with ICT facilities which include a Projector, screen, sound, and Internet facility. All other 12 classrooms have internet facilities. There is one audio-visual room with all ICT facilities used for conducting activities, guest lectures, workshops, seminars, and classes.

Facility for Cultural activities: The college has an Indoor stadium which is purposely used for organizing such cultural events. There is one conference hall is also available which also used for the conduction of cultural events. Every year college organizes the college Annual gathering for the students in which many students participate, to show their skills in different activities.

Facility for Sports and Games: The college has a huge Indoor stadium to organize Indoor games such as Malkhamb, Rope Malkhamb, Table tennis, Badminton, chess, carom, etc. The college has an outdoor basketball court and a huge playground for organizing games such as running, Volleyball, Kho-Kho, Kabaddi, football, cricket, shot put, athletics, etc. Every year students show their participation in various sports events at national, state, university, and college level events.

During the academic session 2018-19 to 2022-23, the following amount was spent on purchasing in lac 1.33806, 0.855, 0.71, 1.12796, and 1.34643 simultaneously.

The college adopted a barcode system for the issue return procedure of books. Criterion 6 - Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1

The institutional governance and leadership are in accordance with the vision and mission of the Institution and it is visible in various institutional practices such as NEP implementation, sustained institutional growth, decentralization, participation in the institutional governance and in their short term and long term Institutional Perspective Plan.

Response:

The governance of the institute is mainly carried out by the Management Council, College Development Committee (CDC), and Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). The CDC is formed according to the norms of the Maharashtra University Act and consists of executive committee members, teachers, non-teaching staff, and students. The IQAC is made up of stakeholders directed by NAAC. The institution consults with both the IQAC and CDC for major policy decisions and important proposals that contribute to the development of the institution and work towards achieving its vision and mission.

Qualified teachers are appointed to enhance the teaching and learning of the students, and more than 75% have been appointed in the college than the sanctioned post. Since many students come from rural areas, they face challenges during higher education such as poor English, weak communication skills, less interaction with teachers, and lack of confidence. To overcome such issues, various activities such as guest lectures, workshops, NSS activities, cultural programs, seminars, social activities, competitions, study tours, and more are organized as per the academic calendar, which helps them to gain confidence and express themselves.

The Competitive Examination and Placement Cell organizes various programs for the students to provide them with knowledge and information about career opportunities after completing UG or PG. The college also offers self-financed certificate courses for students, such as vermicomposting, fashion designing, welding fabrication, and other skill-based training courses.

The college also provides opportunities and facilities for the development of students in sports and games. As a result, the students have shone in Khelo-India, inter-university, state, and university-level competitions over the last five years. Students are made aware of social responsibilities through NSS, and many programs and events are organized for them. As a result, the college was awarded the Best NSS College and Best Program Officer award in 2020-21.

The effective leadership is reflected in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management.

The IQAC and CDC for major policy decisions and important proposals that contribute to the development of the institution and work towards achieving its vision and mission. IQAC prepares the planning for working in academics and administrative departments. Planning is executed through the different working committees in college.

There are 36 committees and cells working in the college, for which conveners coordinators, and

members are appointed by the college from full-time teaching staff, non-teaching staff, and students who work for the functioning and organization of events.

The college organizes many events such as conferences, seminars, NSS camps, and cultural events and also conducts many academic works such as university examinations, Internal examinations, participation in NIRF, academic audits, environmental audits, etc for this work conveners are leads in work, takes the charge and decentralize the work and completed the task with the participation of members and stakeholders.

The college conducts many NSS events including university-level and college-level camps, and the NSS program officer leads in conducting these activities. Response:

The Management of the college VSPM Academy of Higher Education plays the pivotal role of laying down most of the policies, both administrative and governance for the effective functioning of the college as per the guidelines received from the government and the university. The Governing Body comprising the President, vice–president, Secretary, and Treasurer coordinates with the Principal for the smooth operation of the administrative work of the college.

Being a grant-in-aid college, the university /state government norms are strictly followed for the appointment of staff and promotions. The selection, recruitment, and promotion of the staff of self-financed programs are as per the policy of management.

The principal, the head of the institution, is responsible for administrative and academic activities. The principal is empowered and responsible for implementing the policies and decisions of the statutory bodies, management, and higher bodies. IQAC plans and supervises activities for the development in collaboration with the principal. The policy matters are effectively addressed by the Principal to maintain the academic standards of excellence. The Principal is assisted by non-teaching staff comprising the Office superintendent, Head Clerk, senior and junior administrative clerks, and other administrative staff.

The institute also has a College Development Committee (CDC) and Staff Council for the review and planning of policies for college development. The principal is the head of the institution; under the chairmanship of the principal, various statutory and non-statutory committees are framed. The following committees are in force: Governing Body, College Development Committee (CDC), Staff Council, IQAC, Examination Cell, Academic Committee, Admission Committee, Research, Purchase and Budget Requisition Committee, Prospectus Committee, Timetable Committee, and Internal Examination Committees. For student support and facilities, various committees like NSS, Sports cultural committees for extracurricular activities, competitive examination, cocurricular, training and placement, magazine designing, Internal complaint committee, anti-ragging, and website publishing have been framed.

IQAC and CDC play an important role in the deployment of strategic and perspective plans. IQAC prepares the academic calendar before the start of the academic session which includes complete academic planning and deployment of planning was done through the different academic committees. Review of deployment observed in the IQAC meetings.

Planning for infrastructural addition, purchases, audits, expenditures, and planning conduction of major events was done by the IQAC in collaboration with the CDC. Strategies and planning for such major work are discussed in meetings of the CDC and after sanctions, these work are deployed under the vision of IQAC.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The important source of funds for the college is the fees of the grant-in-aid courses, which are regulated as per the university norms. The fund raised through the fees is utilised for various expenditures with proper planning. It contains various recurring and non-recurring expenditures. The planning of expenditure is carried out in consultation with all the heads of the departments through discussions in regular meetings. Laboratory maintenance fund is disbursed to each department as per students' strengths. Every department proposes a budget of recurring and non-recurring expenses based on the availability and need of resources.

The university-approved self-financed graduate and post-graduate programmes are also run by the institute. The fee structure of these programmes is regulated by the affiliating university. The budget of expenses and planning of expenditures is made in consultation with all the heads of the departments through discussions in the meeting. The amount is used for teachers' remuneration, contingencies, and recurring and non-recurring expenditures of self-financed programmes. A budget is prepared by the coordinator of respective programmes for recurring and non-recurring expension.

The funds for additional expenses such as Infrastructural development and maintenance are provided by the parent VSPM Academy of Higher Education, Nagpur. The Budget for the proposed expenses of the college is passed annually by the College Development Committee (CDC).

The grant received from UGC or other Government and Non-government agencies under specific norms has been utilised in the proper channel. The Purchase Committee is established at the institute level which approves the purchase proposals from various departments.

Students from the grant and non-grant courses are eligible for the scholarship and are allotted the scholarship amount received from the government through the proper channel.

Various grant-in-aid and self-financed graduate and postgraduate programmes are run by the institute. An internal auditor appointed by the parent organization VSPM Academy of Higher Education, Nagpur carries out an annual audit on a regular basis.

Joint Director, Higher Education, Nagpur, the divisional head of grant-in-aid colleges conducts external audit as per their audit plan and timetable.

Arvindbabu Deshmukh Mahavidyalaya Bharsingi has been providing education for the last 36 years in rural areas of Grampanchayat Bharsingi, Tah. Narkhed, Dist. Nagpur. College is surrounded by so many small villages and students come here to take education in various streams like college Arts, Science, and Commerce. Maximum students who come to our college are not aware of their futures and they don't come to us with the appropriate mission, vision, and goals that they have to achieve in their life. Our institute works in this region to provide good education, awareness, and vision and to find out their goals from a few decades. Mission and Vision of the College is

MISSION:-

To become a Center of quality education by promoting high academic and social pursuits and competencies of students of rural regions for all-round development

VISION:

To impart higher education for all-round development of the students of rural area."

College is currently running three UG courses Bachelor of Arts, Commerce and Science that is B.A., B.Com., B.Sc. and one PG course M.A. (Marathi), M.Com. every year nearly new 540 students are admitted to this course and every year nearly 350 students complete their education UG and PG from college.

Students who come to the college are from economically weaker sections as most of them have a family dependency on farming or labor work. Students are also doing this work along with their parents as per the availability of time to them. Due to this, it was found that many boys and girls are capable of doing hard physical work and these students can show their extraordinary performance in sports events conducted by the college.

Our physical education department always keeps observing students who are physically and mentally strong and also have an interest in sports activities. The college physical education department selects such students for different games gives them training and prepare them for the different sports events at University, State, Inter-university, and National level. During the last five years college performance in sports has been extraordinary, so many students had great performances at the University, State, Inter-university, and National levels. College and students' performance during the last five years is mentioned below. Only during the academic session 2020-21, due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, sports events are not organized by authorities at the University, State, and National levels so students do not show their participation.
